A person gets everything by giving everything in the Christian life. He gets God in place of the vain nothingness that makes up the human selfishness and pride. Pride is generally the camouflage a person uses to hide his poverties. A person gives up an unprofitable, bankrupt business for the most profitable and enriching way of life in time and eternity. A young person gives up everything that imperils his happiness to receive from God everything that insures his happiness. If you have tried this, you will believe it. If you have not tried it, test it for yourself and see what happens.

A Christian is a person who has given up the burden of sin and guilt, and assumed the burden of prayer and Christian concern. A Christian is a burden-bearer. In reality every person is a burden-bearer. The difference is that the burden that a sinful person carries is crushing him to death, while the burden of love and Christian concern that the follower of Christ assumes is a burden of blessing and enrichment of life. The person who shares the burden of Jesus should find the secret of true happiness.

The selfish life is the life of emptiness and poverty. The law of spiritual things says, "The increase of happiness in heart, mind and soul is made by sharing things with others." The mind that shares its thoughts enhances them and gets others. The heart that gives itself in love, goodwill, forgiveness, and Christian tolerance gets an increase of those things in his own nature. One's capacity for love shrinks and grows poor if he does not send out his love in sincere sympathy and Christian good-will. The one who is giving most is actually getting most. It is the law of the Kingdom Life.

A Christian can live in two worlds at the same time. Jesus did; and he made it possible for us to do it too. He was not of the world but it was for the world that he gave his life. The more of God's world that gets into our souls, and into our conduct, the more blessed and successful this life becomes. Heaven begins here. And if it doesn't begin for us here it will not continue for us anywhere else.
