THE CHURCH IN THE WORLD

NOTED PREACHER PASSES

Rev. Charles Monroe Sheldon, D. D., famous throughout the Christian world as author of "In His Steps," died last week at his home in Texas. Had he lived until Feb. 26th, Dr. Sheldon would have been 89 years of age. Born at Wellsville, N. Y., the famous preacherauthor was ordained to the ministry of the Congregational Church in 1886. He was pastor of Central Congregational Church in Topeka, Kan., for 23 years. Besides writing the book which gained a circulation second only to the Bible, and made his name famous around the world, Dr. Sheldon made other notable contributions to the generations he served. For one week in 1900, Dr. Sheldon edited the newspaper, "Topeka Capital," conducting the business "as Christ would edit a newspaper." As a result of that remarkable experiment, the circulation of the paper multiplied amazingly and was read throughout the nation. An outstanding servant of God has passed on.

I hope that those who read this may be similarly affected. He can't be with us much longer. Let us send him a love offering and experience the joy which Jesus speaks of: it being "more blessed to give than to receive."
