## MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE

Hartland Mission Station,  
April 20th, 1946.

Dear Highway Friends:

Greetings to you all. The calendar here in my room shows a picture of the first Easter morning, the angel of the Lord descending to roll away the stone from the tomb. How glad we are that Jesus arose, that He lay down His life of Himself. No man took it from Him, and He was able to arise again to take it up of Himself.

"Ring out the blessed news again,  
O bear aloft the strain,  
The mighty God is risen in power,  
He did not die in vain."

Thank God, there is a resurrection morning for us each if we accept His sacrifice on the cross for us. My heart rejoices today in His wonderful love and in the great salvation He has provided for me, a poor lost sinner. "His blood avails for Adam's race, and sprinkles now the throne of grace." "We love Him because He first loved us."

Trust you all have had a blessed Easter.

Charlie left this morning for Myenis"—Salina Mavuso's outpost. It is only about three miles from the station. Salina went over on Wednesday to examine some of the people, and today they expect to have Communion. Trust they will have a good service.

George left on Saturday morning for his visit to one of the outposts in the Pongola valley. I think Paul Nkosi, one of our ordained elders, is to be there too. George took a supply of atabrin, quinine, and pyagara along. Malaria is very bad right now. There have been many deaths and some days we have eight or nine people coming for atabrin and quinine. We were able to obtain two bottles of quinine and several dozens of atabrin and it has greatly helped people. We got a girl as our cook and she had only been here about one day and then had to go to hospital with malaria. Her mother came and took her home in spite of all our protests. She was still very weak. Paulina Lukele, one of our workers, has been very ill with it. After she got better, she came to the hospital for a few days to get more medicine. It is a long distance and she was very weak when she arrived. She had lost considerable weight and walked like an old person. We hear that she is still improving. We do thank the Lord for protecting us from this disease.

The Lord is blessing in our midst. The meetings seem to be getting better. There is a meeting in one of the kraals each Friday night now. The first two were here at the station. Last Friday night it was at Johan Maseko's kraal. His daughter, Gadelina who has been recently married, and his sister, Losilena Zikalala gave them-

selves to seek the Lord. This is very encouraging. We trust these meetings will be times of great blessings, and that the Lord will give us a real revival.

Hospital work keeps much the same. We expect the inspectors here to visit us soon. The doctor still comes out once a week for clinic. A week ago, we had one little boy who was a real strong man. He had been very anxious to come to hospital, but when his turn came, he kicked and clawed and tried to knock people right and left. At last we put him on a bed and three or four of us held him while Dr. Elihers gave him his injection. He rushed out and picked up a stone and hurled it at the native man who had helped us hold him. I think the stone struck the man on the arm. So he took off his belt and gave the little fellow a hiding. After he finished the little fellow's mother had her turn at him. The other day he returned to the clinic and walked in like a little man, took his injection, and stayed around as if he wouldn't mind having another. We are glad they do not all act that way, but it did break up the monotony of our routine and gave us all a laugh.

Yesterday the Lord graciously gave us a nice little rain. The air seemed so nice and fresh afterwards, and everything looked so nice after the bath, that Charlie and I were remarking about it. One learns to appreciate even the smallest drop of rain out here.

Our little daughter is growing and is a great joy to us. We expect to move into the other house next month. It will seem very nice as we have been rather crowded. It will be quieter for Pamela too.

We praise the Lord for all the blessings He has bestowed upon us, and desire to serve Him better each day.
