EDITORIAL

ARE YOU READY FOR CAMP MEETING?

For weeks previous to Camp Meeting, attention is, given to preparation.

The pastors and churches have many tasks to complete the year's work and make plans for the care of the local church on Camp Meeting Sundays. Wives and mothers are busy gathering together food, clothing, etc., necessary to the two-week sojourn. Our officers and committees are engaged with preparation of reports. Many are the details which demand our attention in making ready for this annual meeting. Perhaps this year's business can be speeded up by all co-operating to get Church, Sunday School, Missionary Society and Young People's reports in promptly so as to allow secretaries to get their statements ready in good time. Committees might see to it that their reports are ready to be presented early in the Alliance sessions.

There is more to preparing for Camp Meeting than attending to statistical reports, however. The Camp Meeting proper is a spiritual event. Ten days are spent in prayer, praise and ministry of the Word. Beulah Camp has been the meeting place of God and man throughout the years of its history. Here saints have been refreshed and renewed in spiritual strength. Here unsanctified believers have entered the Canaan of perfect love. Here backsliders have been restored and sinners reconciled to God. Hundreds of people remember Beulah Camp as a Bethel where heavenly visions broke upon their souls.

We prayerfully hope that the spiritual tide of this year's Camp will be at least as high as in previous years, that when we turn homeward again we shall be able to say in truth: "It was a great Camp Meeting."

. Perhaps we little realize how nearly the destiny of our Camp Meeting is determined before the shutters are open on the Tabernacle.

The spiritual condition of the people of God is a vital factor in fixing the level of the Camp. If one person comes to Camp spiritually lean or barren, one person has arrived who has litte to contribute to the real success of the meeting. On the other hand, if one person arrives in the fulness of the blessing, in step with God, in the Spirit of prayer, ready armed to battle with the powers which hold captive the souls of men, one person has arrived who casts weight in the balances in favour of God

and the spiritual success of the meetings about to begin. Multiply either by ten, twenty, a hundred, and you will be able to estimate with fair accuracy what the outcome of the Camp will be.

The question every man, woman and young person, who, professing the name of Christ, plans to attend this year's Camp, the soulsearching question we should direct toward ourselves is: "Am I ready for Camp Meeting?" Is my soul flourishing in the nouishment of newly-gathered manna? Am I prepared to wrestle against spirit forces which hold in bondage the sin-enslaved?

The Lord will be awaiting our arrival at Camp. Shall we be ready to receive the blessing He is so willing to bestow?
