YOUTH IN ACTION

During Youth Week, Jan. 27-Feb. 3, eight young people will receive scholarships up to \$1600 each. This money is to be granted through the United Christian Youth Movement. To qualify, the young people must be between 16 and 24, and at least a senior in High School. The final requirement is the presentation of an essay on "The Meaning of Christian Faith in My Community."

The establishing of "youth rooms" in some of the churches across Canada has been so successful, that they are now to be installed in every United Church in British Columbia. The rooms are to serve as a meeting place where young people can discuss their problems or engage in religious study.

In a recent article Dr. J. B. Chapman said to both young and old: "The old must die, the young may die, and there is no escape for any. There is therefore only one wise thing to do, and that is to get right with God now, live the Christian life every day and hour, and keep in such condition of preparedness as to be able to say with St. Paul: 'For to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain.'"

The theme for "Youth Week" is "Influencing the World for Christ." What is your part as a young person in influencing others for Christ? The **Herald of Holiness** has some worthwhile suggestions:
