PAUL MAKES A NEW START

Lesson: Acts 26:9-18; I. Corinthians 15:8-10 Golden Text: This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. I. Timothy 1:15

COMMENTS ON THE LESSON

The main part of our lesson today is taken from Paul's address to king Agrippa. Being a Jew the king was familiar with Paul's language as he described the early part of his life in the Jews' religion.

I. PAUL BEFORE CONVERSION: Acts 26:9. I verily thought within myself, that I aught to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth—Paul was following the leading of his unregenerated conscience. His attitude toward the followers of Jesus is abundant evidence that the unenlightened conscience is not an accurate guide in the matters of moral choice.

10. Many of the saints did I shut up in prison—In Paul's own mind he was doing service for God.

II. Being exceedingly mad against them—Paul gave his consent to the death of Stephen and manifested extreme hatred to all the followers of Jesus.

12. **To Damascus with authority**—The Christians evidently had gone to Damascus with the gospel and Paul was going thither in order that he might have them destroyed.

II. PAUL'S CONVERSION: Acts 26:13: I saw in the way a light from Heaven—A supernatural light like unto that which guided the children of Israel out of Egypt.

14. Saul, Saul, why persecuteth thou me— Jesus identifies himself with his followers. To persecute them is to persecute Jesus.

15. Who art thou Lord—Saul recognized the Deity of Jesus.

16. I have appeared unto thee for this purpose, to make thee a minister and a witness—Saul was not only to be a minister, but also a witness, for indeed it is impossible to minister to others that which we have not experienced in our own lives

17. Unto whom now I send thee—This is Paul's commission to preach to the Gentiles.

18. To open their eyes—There are five senses of the soul which correspond with the five senses of the body. In our original state of sin these five spiritual senses are locked up. It requires the light of the gospel to open them.

III. PAUL'S CONSECRATION: I. Corinthians 15:8. Last of all he was seen of me also—Paul refers to his vision of Christ on his way to Damascus.

9. I am the least of the apostles—In his own estimation of himself Paul was the least of all the apostles, because of his once opposition to Christ's followers.

10. I labored more abundantly than they all—In the abundance and fruitfulness of his labors Paul surpassed all the other Apostles. This was both because of his unusual natural ability and consecration.

QUESTIONS AND THEMES FOR DISCUSSION

1. Is the conscience always a proper guide to follow in the matters of moral choice?

2. Why do you suppose Saul's conversion is recorded so many times in Scripture?

3. What accounts for Paul's outstanding success as an apostle?

PAUL TRAINS FOR HIS LIFE WORK

Lesson: Acts 9:19-22; 11:25-26; Galatians 1:77-24

Golden Text: Straightway he preached Christ in the synagogues, that he is the Son of God. Acts 9:20

COMMENTS ON THE LESSON

It is preferable that every man have training for his life work and especially the preacher. In our previous lessons we have records of Paul's educational achievements. Shortly after Paul's conversion he went to Arabia for an unstated period. According to the opinion of Bible students he devoted considerable time there studying the Hebrew Scriptures in the light of his new knowledge.

I. PAUL THE PREACHER: Acts 9:19: Then was Saul certain days with the disciples which were at Damascus—A short period of time which was no doubt used for instruction in every Christian doctrine.

20. Preached Christ in the synagogue that he is the Son of God—The Jews as a nation did not believe in the Deity of Jesus Christ and hence did not accept him as Saviour. Saul was now convinced that Jesus was the Messiah and proclaimed him as such.

21. All they that heard him were amazed—Because Paul was known as the persecutor of Christ.

22. Saul increased the more in strength—
"The events recorded in verses 20-22 must be taken as extending over the whole period from his conversion to his escape by being let down from the walls and his going to Jerusalem, which he declares (Galatians 1:18) was at the end of three years, and within that time occurred his retirement in Arabia"—Dr. Adam Clarke

II. PAUL THE TEACHER: Acts 11:25. Then departed Barnabas to Tarsus, for to seek Saul—The church at Antioch now needed a teacher and Saul appealed to Barnabas as the man for the task.

26. And taught much people—The church today still needs a teaching ministry. The disciples were first called Christians in Antioch—It is accepted that the name Christians as applied to disciples originated from the heathen population at Antioch.

III. PAUL THE WRITER: Galatians 1:17.

I went into Arabia—Arabia is south east of Damascus.

18. After three years I went to see Peter at Jerusalem—Doubtless three years after his conversion.

19. Other of the apostles saw I none—Evidently the other apostles were elsewhere supervising other churches.

20. I write unto you—Paul wrote under the inspiration of the Holy Ghost. He is endeavouring to prove that his writings were given to him by direct revelation and independently of the other twelve apostles.

21. I came unto the regions of Syria and Cilicia—Paul was by this time feeling his call to preach to the Gentiles. This was natural since he was born in a Roman province. On leaving Jerusalem he goes to Tarsus, his home city in Cilicia. We may reasonably suppose that he did missionary work in Tarsus and in the adjoining Syria. The inference from the next three verses of the lesson is that they heard in Judea concerning Paul's work in Syria and Cilicia.

QUESTIONS AND THEMES FOR DISCUSSION

1. What doctrine did Paul preach at Damascus and why?

2. What caused Paul to go to Antioch? Why was he suited for labors in that place?
3. Why was it natural for Paul to associate a call to work among the Gentiles with his

vision of Jesus?
