NATIONAL HOLINESS ASSOCIATION CONVENTION

After two years without an annual convention, the National Association for the Promotion of Holiness met at Cleveland Bible College, Cleveland, Ohio, April 9-12, for its 78th Annual Meeting. Many felt this was the greatest convention in the history of the Association.

One hundred and fifty ministers, missionaries and Christian workers from all over the world participated and many denominations sent delegates. The co-operation of these groups was splendid. More groups were received into auxiliary relationship than in any previous convention. A new vim and vitality was evident.

Ninety missionaries were present and the National Holiness Missionary Society report given by Dr. Harry Jessop, Treasurer, revealed the fact that the N. H. M. S. did \$334,223.35 worth of business in the last two years.

The convention opened with Dr. C. I. Armstrong, President, in the chair. The song service was conducted by our beloved brother, Rev. Don Morris. The address of welcome was brought by the President of Cleveland Bible College, Rev. Worthy Spring.

It was the consensus of opinion that the retiring preident who could not succeed himself, had done a splendid work and had given the organization a new vision, new enlargement and vitality. Rev. H. M. Courchenour, of Boynton, Pa., a well known interdenominational evangelist and President of Bentleyville Camp, was elected President of the N. H. S. on the first ballot, receiving 62 votes.

Dr. R. Nicholson, editor of "The Wesleyan Methodist" of Syracuse, N. Y., opened the devotional service with a message stressing the need of pentecostal power in our lives.

Drs. Paul Rees and G. Arnold Hodgin brought a memorial tribute to those two veterans of the cross, Rev. Joseph Smith and Rev. John Duryea who have passed to their heavenly reward. Dr. Armstrong commented on their lives and ministry.

It was decided to put a full time worker in the field to organize state and county holiness associations. Fourteen state auxiliaries reported.

Dr. L. R. Marston, President of the National Association of Evangelicals, was present and gave a splendid address, and Dr. Harry Jessop of Chicago Evangelistic Institute, gave the morning Bible readings on "The Blood Bought Church." These were extraordinary and much appreciated.

The Educational Committee held some fine meetings led by Dr. J. A. Huffman.

It was decided to organize a Holiness Youth Crusade.

The evening preaching services were held in the First Methodist Church where Dr. Paul Rees preached an excellent sermon on "The Seed of Survival," and Rev. Foreman Lincicome preached on "The Soul, it's Value and Perils." Rev. Dwight Ferguson preached about Philip and the last message was brought by Dr. Z. T. Johnson on "Holiness." These messages were followed by gracious altar services. Song services were led by Byron Crouse, who did a splendid job.

The N. H. A. decided to affiliate with the

N. A. E. Rev. R. H. Hamilton brought greetings from the Canadian Holiness Federation.

Rev. R. O. Rice, of California, recommended that all holiness periodicals be made the media of the Association. It was agreed to do so in so far as possible.

Dr. J. A. Huffman organized a protest to be sent to the Committee on the Revision of the New Revised New Testament. He claimed they had committed an academic and theological blunder in translating the word "Sanctification" twenty out of twenty-two instances as "Consecration" only.

The convention climaxed with a great all day missionary meeting. Rev. Lela McConnell reported her work in the Kentucky mountains. Chaplain (Major) Roland Hudson and Rev. Everett Cattell spoke for India, also Rev. J. Reamans, Dr. K. P. Wesche for China, also Rev. Rolland Rice. Dr. Hotchkiss and Rev. Virgil Kirkpatrick for Africa and Rev. R. H. Story reported the Philippine work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The glory of the convention and the souls that were helped we cannot describe. What a gathering of the faithful this was and all are looking forward to the next meeting at Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky, in 1947.
