Dear Highway Friends:

As the time for Beulah Camp draws near, how
I long once more to visit this beloved spot where
at least two of my life's greatest experiences
took place—where I was ordained and received
the baptism of the Holy Ghost as a second definite
experience.

After I returned from Dennysville, and had
settled the question of my future, father was going
to Hampton, N. S. for a load of fish and asked
me if I wished to go along. After we arrived
at Hampton, while father was waiting for his
load of fish, I went down to Phinney Cove and
started meetings in an old Free Baptist Church
and at once a revival was on. Father got his load
of fish and had to go home alone. Fifty people
had been converted. I then went down to Parker's
Cove ten miles below and began meetings

there and soon a revival was on. I sent for Sanford
Richardson to come and baptize them for me. Then
Rev. Horatio Cosman of Sanford and Aaron Kinney
came up and organized a church in each place and
after my stay there of six weeks, I went home to
Lubec and then we moved to Young's Cove, Annapolis
Co., N. S., halfway between Phinney's and Parker's
Cove, and were there five years. During that time
Brother George McDonald, Cosman, and Kinney were
to have ordained me, but the Lord planned otherwise
and only two of the Council arrived, so it was postponed.

I will close this story with an experience we
had during those years when we lived from day to
day, trusting only in God for our daily needs. We
got up one morning and had no hay to feed our horse
and no money, so in our morning devotions we asked
Father to supply our need. We lived a half mile on
a back road where we could not see the main highway
because of a rise of ground, but we kept looking
down toward the road and about 10 a. m. we saw
something like a pair of ox horns coming up over
the hill and soon a load of hay appeared. They came
in the farm yard and when I went out I found a
stranger. I asked him where he was going as ours
was the last house on the road. He said, "Does the
preacher who preaches at Parker's Cove live here?"
I said, "Yes, I am he". Then he said, "Well, this
is the place". He went on to say: "When wife and
I were at prayer this morning, the Lord said 'take
that preacher over the mountain a load of hay'. I
have the best of rewards just to know that I am
living close enough to God so that He can get my
ear to help him answer some other one of his
saints who call upon him in their distress." Oh
how faithful He is to prove His watchful care over
those who trust in Him. Do not doubt His promises.
