THE GOSPEL AND YOUTH

There are times when Christian leaders seem to think in terms of several gospels, as that term is used to designate the Christian message. There are many applications of the gospel but there can be, in reality, but one gospel, and that is the one which places Christ at its center and which reveals God's plan and purpose in redemption.

There is no such thing as a gospel for young people and a gospel for older people. There are areas of need among young people which have been passed by many older people, and there are areas of need among older people which young people have not yet reached, but the gospel is essentially one. It is so constructed as to be able to meet people of all ages at the point of greatest need.

Young people are frequently asking questions concerning the person of God and concerning reasons for His dealings with people in rather strange ways. The mind of youth is never satisfied to accept a thing just because someone "says so," it wants to know, and has a right to know, the reason why.

Quite often young people see in Christ, as revealed by the Gospel, certain ideals and practices which reflect a very great inconsistency in the way the ordinary Christian lives. This very attitude is a testimony in favor of the fact that the gospel is as much for youth as for any age—perhaps, generally, more appealing to young people, when properly presented, than to those who live in the zone of complacency and static conception.

The crying need of the hour is to confront young people with the gospel, not a watered form of the gospel, and there will be a ready response to its claims. Young people need a kind of message which will find them where they are and point the way to where they long to be.—The Telescope-Messenger.
