- 2. It is bound up with the doctrine of Sonship with God and likeness to Christ (1 John 3:1, 2).
- 3. It is bound up with the doctrine and promise of the Transfiguration of the Living (1 Cor. 15:51, 52).
- 4. It is bound up with the doctrine and promise of rewards (2 Tim. 4:7, 8; Rev. 22:12; 1 Pet. 5:4).
- 5. It is bound up with the doctrine of the Atonement (Heb. 9:14-28; Luke 1:8-10, 21).
- 6. It is bound up with the doctrine of Future Judgment (2 Tim. 4:1).
- 7. It is bound up with the doctrine of Sanctification (1 Thess. 3:12, 13).

The Truth of the Second Coming of Christ is Eminently Practical. It is Bound up With Every Practical Exhortation to Christian Obligation. Service and Attainment. Observe:

- 1. It is bound up with the exhortation to meet together on the Lord's Day (Heb. 10:25).
- 2. It is bound up with the exhortation to properly observe the Lord's Supper (1 Cor. 11:26).
- 3. It is bound up with the exhortation to patience (James 5: 7-8).
- 4. It is bound up with the exhortation to a holy life (1 John 3:3; Tit. 2:11, 13; 1 Thess. 5:23).
- 5. It is bound up with the exhortation to abide in him (1 John 2:28).
- 6. It is bound up with the exhortation to Christian Activity (Rom. 13:11, 12).
- 7. It is bound up with the exhortation to watchfulness (Mark 13:34-37).
- 8. It is bound up with the exhortation not to judge one another (1 Cor. 4:4, 5).
- 9. It is bound up with the exhortation to pastoral fidelity (II Tim. 4:1, 2; 1 Pet. 5:2-4).
- 10. It is bound up with the exhortation to comfort and console those who mourn their Christian dead (1 Thess. 4:13-18).
- 11. It is bound up with the exhortation to zeal for the salvation of souls (1 Cor. 4:3-5; 1 Thess. 2:19, 20; 1:9, 10).
