A poor woman, who had lived a life of hard-ship and penury, visited a coastal town and for the first time had a glimpse of the mighty rolling ocean. If that Apostle, Andrew, ever preached a great sermon, there is no record of it. Also there is no account of his endowing a college. He probably had no outstanding gifts and no great resources.

Someone has called him "Andrew the Ordinary," and then again he has been spoken of as "Andrew the Introducer" because he was found two or three times introducing someone to Jesus.

However, read John 1:40-42, "One of the two which heard John speak, and followed him, was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first findeth his own brother Simon, and saith unto him, We have found the Messias, which is, being interpreted, the Christ. And he brought him to Jesus."

So Andrew, who was not so great himself, brought Peter to the Lord! Peter, the leader of the Apostles; Peter, the preacher of the day of Pentecost; Peter, the great evangelist of the early church.

Some of us know that we are very much like Andrew, lacking in those qualities which men call great. No one cares to follow us. We never do outstanding things. We cannot. We are ordinary.

Very well, perhaps we can do as Andrew, bring another to the Lord. It may be that the child or youth we bring will prove greater and more directly useful, at least more conspicuously useful, than the one who brought him.

We speak of the "stars" in the crowns of those who have brought others to the Lord Iesus.

But, if Peter and Spurgeon are to have rewards for their great achievements for their Lord, then no doubt infinite Wisdom and Justice and Goodness will find some way to recompense the Andrew who brought Peter, the unknown Methodist exhorter who effectually invited Spurgeon, and you because you brought another who served well.—Sel.
