CONTEMPLATIONS IN A SYNAGOGUE -> STILL DESPISED AND REJECTED

tion had been reported nearing the end. Her No Christian can sit long in a synagogue without being profoundly impressed with the strange fact that the One Jew who has won the honor and acclaim of the whole civilized world is regarded as an alien by His own people. His name is never mentioned in an orthodox synagogue, and any favorable reference to Him would be regarded as an affront. And yet Jesus was a loyal Jew, the most loyal Jew that ever lived. It is He who has given a

meaning to Jewish history, who has realized the loftiest ideals of the Jewish religion, and who has added more honor to the Jewish name than any other son of Israel who ever lived. It is He who has carried the law of Moses into every corner of the world, who has made His name and that of a hundred other Jews, like Joshua, Samuel, David, Isaiah, Peter and Paul, household words among people of every land and race and clime and color. Moreover, it is He who has sown the seeds of kindness and respect toward His people in the hearts of all who truly believe in Him and seek to follow in His footsteps, so that Jews in an unfriendly world are safer, freer, and more prosperous in those lands where Christ is most highly honored and loved, and where His Spirit mey take tracts, books a slisyorquylebiw teom

-As Illistened to the praise, the beautiful melody, sad with the pathos of centuries of suffering and the weariness of long-deferred hopes, I found myself wishing that there might enter into it the spirit of triumph which Christ has inspired. The sermon in English by angifted rabbi dealt largely with frustrated Zionist plans, the divided counsel of Zionist leaders, the opposition of Arabs, and the responsibility of England to fulfill the promise of the Balfour Declaration if the distressed Jews of Europe were to find a refuge from the woes that they were being subjected to darkness of these peopemiger relities and rebut
