things which will soon cease and pass away. When these things are "clean gone forever," where will these poverty stricken souls, poor in the true riches of holiness, find a place of rest and fulfillment?

When holiness, the true universal element, is neglected and then rejected, the door is swung wide open for the devil to enter with his soul-damning delusions. What better and more fertile ground could the devil desire for his deceptions than an unsanctified nature that is all agog over signs, wonders and manifestations? What better and more fertile ground for sin could the devil find than the heart that refuses a present holiness but exults in a fancied eternal security? Many religions are fully as dangerous for the truth they omit as for the error they teach. In the final analysis, the real reason for the enthronement of outright error or misplaced truth is the unwillingness to put holiness where it rightly belongs. If we assume that a wholly sincere soul could come to the judgment in an unsanctified condition and therefore unfit to meet a holy God, we are driven to the blasphemous assertion that God the Father demanded holiness, that God the Son died to procure it, but that God the Holy Ghost was not able to convey the message, Those do not always honor the Holy Ghost the most whose mention of him is most frequent. Jesus said that true love to him consisted in the acknowledgment and keeping of his commandments. By the same token, those who honor the Holy Ghost the most are those who most deeply believe in and proclaim his wholly-sanctifying mission here on earth. From mere lip-service may the God of truth deliver us!

Brethren, beloved, we must be careful to maintain a Christian charity to those outside of holiness ranks; but if we are to survive as a movement in the earth we must unswervingly hold to and point toward the true universal.
