(Continued from Page 1) when applied to some local circumstance. When the Christian meets up with some such circumstance there seems but one course for him to pursue—the course laid down by our Lord. Things of this kind are not to be settled on the absurdity of the circumstance, but on the reaction the same will have upon the disciple and his Lord.

A man offered to sell another man butter without receiving coupons. A small matter when tried by itself but laying a foundation for consequences far-reaching. A Christian man and his attitude toward law is involved. A Christian man and his influence with his neighbor is involved. Don't say that the neighbor will never thnk of it again. The chances are, he will never forget it. And if law is to be respected, who is to say what law? Whether this or that? I believe the circumstance in question would be settled by our Lord: "Go thou and give unto them, lest we should offend." In other words, respect the ruling.

I have stated but one example. The ruling, however, applies to life as we meet it from day to day. To always be governed so that the possibility of offence will be cut down to a minimum is surely the part of wisdom for Christian men in a world like this. When our lives are lived and our decisions are made with the words of Jesus sounding in our ears: "For Me and thee," they will help us to live more carefully, and make our decisions more paryerfully, "lest we offend."
