I am sure that you would appreciate a report from our new church in Truro. Those who have seen the property are made to feel that the Lord was surely leading in the taking over of this work. Possibly some were a little dubious, as to whether the people worshipping here, would remain to become the nucleus of our local congregation, but, thank God, such is not the case, for the spiritually-minded ones adopted us immediately, and possess a loyalty to truth and our denominational aims, unexcelled anywhere in our constituency.

From the very start it was the desire of the people to undertake improvements, such as the installing of the steam-heating plant now operating efficiently, making it possible for us to use all our facilities during the winter months. The spiritual progress has been very satisfying. The Sunday School averages around forty, blessed with teachers who carry a burden for the salvation of those under their care. The prayer meeting is growing in numbers, also in the presence of the Holy Spirit in our midst. Our Sunday services are well attended, already bearing fruit in visible results. The Young People's work is encouraging, and we have undertaken a half hour weekly broadcast over the local radio station. During the winter we expect to have a personal workers' class, concentrating on means and methods to make us wise in the winning of souls. Friends, we cannot depend on mass evangelism to reach the lost; we must become individual fishers of men.

You have read the report in the last Highway of the official organization of the church on Friday, December 10th, and truly the Spirit's anointing was on that service. Sunday was a great day with Brother Dunlop preaching, and the boys singing in both services. After a stirring message from I. Thess. 5:23, two souls opened their hearts to receive this

blessed experience. We feel that God has given us a great start, but we must possess the land by faith and much labor.

We are grateful that God has placed us in this field and we look forward to the future, trusting the Lord to prosper the work of our hands. May this be a fruitful year, as we join hands to march forward for Christ, in the Maritimes, Maine and the uttermost parts of the earth.
