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THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME

Some Observations on Revelation Thirteen

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What now is the personal, practical challenge of such solemn matters as we have been considering? What shall we do with regard to these realities of the present and these developments of the future? The Bible is an intensely practical book. It calls for conduct to match its creed. Its truth implies a task. As Dr. Scroggie, of England, says, "The subject of the Lord's return is one of intensely practical import, and anything of the nature of curiosity-mongering, date-fixing, and star-gazing, are utterly condemnable." What, then, should we do as we move toward the crisis of all crises. Let me name three things:

1. We should be concerned about our will. "Whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." Revelation 22:17. Have you willed to put your trust in Christ as your Saviour? Have you made your choice to renounce your own fancied goodness and your own vain efforts to save yourself, and, instead, to receive as the unmerited favor of God the saving grace and power of Jesus Christ our Lord.

2. We should be concerned about our walk. Walk before me and be thou perfect," said God to Abraham long ago. (Genesis 17:1). "Walk as children of light," wrote Paul to the Ephesians and he added, "for the fruit of the spirit is in all goodness and righteousness and truth." (Ephesians 5:8-9). When the same apostle wrote to Titus and exhorted him to look for "that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ," he admonished him at the same time that he was to "live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world." And if anyone wants to know how far Christ can go in cleansing the human heart from sin, let him read further what the apostle says in this remarkable passage: "Our Saviour Jesus Christ gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works." (Titus 2:11-14). If you are less holy in heart and life than you are making full use of Christ's purifying power, why not ask Him to sweep out the "beast and last remains of sin" and to enable you to walk consistently in "righteousness and true holiness before Him." 3. We should be concerned about our work. When the Apostle Paul came to the close of his matchless discourse on the return of Christ and the resurrection of the body, he called upon those Christians at Corinth to make this prospect of splendid things to come a driving challenge to immediate and incessant endeavour. Their hope of the advent was to be not a sedative but a stimulus. "Therefore," cried Paul, "my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." (I. Corinthians 15:58).

Then, with surrendered will and sanctified walk and self-sacrificing work, we may lift our eager prayer:

"Saviour, long Thy saints have waited-

Centuries have passed away Since the promise first was given

Of a glorious Advent day; Grey and old the world is growing, Loud the scoffer's boast is heard; But our hearts are peaceful, knowing

We may rest upon Thy Word.

"Lo, the fig-tree buds and blossoms; Lo! the shadows flee away. Glad we lift our heads expectant, Brief will now be Thy delay.

Thou to raise the dead art able, O'er the grave Thou didst prevail; Heaven and earth may prove unstable, But Thy Word can never fail.

"Precious, precious parting promise!

Today is the best day of grace the world has yet seen. And no one can have a sound hope for the better day ahead who is unwilling to receive in full measure the blessings offered today.
