You see, in Africa the girls choose the boys and if the boys want them they pay a certain number of cattle for them. Nomlbulu chose a boy, and the boy paid eighteen cows for her. This was quite a price to pay for a girl, but she belonged to the royal tribe of Swaziland and was thus quite valuable. Now Nomhlubulu was as good as married. According to native custom she was the property of the man who had paid for her.

What preparations Nomhlbulu made for her new home! Oh, the blankets, mats, dresses, etc. She was eagerly looking forward to the time when she would be actually living in her own home. Then, one night Nomhlubulu had a dream. She dreamed that her husband was going to take more than one wife. This is quite acceptable in Africa, but Nomhlbulu knew that Christians never marry under those circumstances. Apparently she wanted to be a good Christian because when she found that her dream was true, she told her would-be husband that she could not be his wife. Unwilling to take "No" for an answer, he dragged her and her hope chest to his home. Nomhlbulu ran away leaving all of her nice things there. She went to her class leader and told her the whole story and asked if she might be baptized and taken into the church. When converted heathen are taken into the church, they choose a Christian name, and for hers, Nomblubulu chose Paulina.

For years Paulina has been a strong Christian. She is still working at the Altona Mission Station, not having any other home. When her former master sold the farm, her parents didn't list her name lest she be drawn into farm service again. So, at the present time Altona is Paulina's only home. However, in Tuly she hopes to have another home, and one of her own at that. Charlie, one of our own Christian boys, is coming during his winter holidays to claim her as his bride. They will probably be married here at Altona. This will, we trust, be one more good Christian home. Both of these young people should prove themselves faithful servants of the Almighty God. We are praying for them that their faith fail not, and that they pay allegiance to the great King of Kings.
