BETHANY BIBLE COLLEGE

Since Bethany is a Reformed Baptist College, we desire to work with and for the Reformed Baptist Church. We can do this best if we maintain close contact with the constituency, letting them know what is happening here in Bethany and also listening to their comments and suggestions as to how they may best be served.

Our first desire is that Bethany should be thoroughly spiritual. We believe that thus we can best serve the church and our Lord. But we also need to keep in contact with those who are our prayer supporters.

It seems that the Lord has put His seal on the college from the start. In our first prayer meeting God's melting came on the service and God poured out His Spirit in a marked manner again as Rev. F. A. Watson preached the first sermon in our new chapel. Since then, a number of students have found victory in saving and sanctifying power for which we praise the Lord. One may hear some students praying almost any time when there are no classes. The tower on the top of the building is a fine upper room for our boys and has become a tower of retreat for spiritual strength. Our girls have a special prayer room on the second floor of the building. Prayer is stressed continually. We have family worship morning and evening; we open classes with prayer; the students in each room have devotions together morning and evening. Besides chapel twice a week with singing, prayer and a message, we have Morning Watch before breakfast every Sunday, and a prayer meeting 1:30—2:00 P.M. every Sunday for missionaries and missions work. Quiet Hour is observed 2:00-3:00 P.M. every Sunday when students can meditate before the Lord in their rooms. Sunday School is at 10:00 a.m. followed by preaching with each male member of the faculty preaching in his turn. Sunday evening at 7:00 the students are in full charge of the service and they bring some fine messages. Tuesday evenings at least twenty of us have been going to CILS radio studio and sending the Gospel in song and preached word over the air into homes where we are not able to go. However, our time of broadcasting is being changed from Tuesday to Friday 7:00-7:30 p.m. We have our mid-week prayer meeting Thursday evenings.

You pastors and older parents know that young people in the adolescent period often have some problems which bring them to the altar once in a while. We have some good melting times around the altar here, and, praise the Lord! we feel that some of our young people are getting established and fitted for the whitened harvest fields. Please pray much for us.

One young man expects to go to China and

open a mission station, others are planning to go to Africa, and still others are training to do the home work on pastorates. One young man finishes his Bible School training the last of this month and will be ready to take a pastorate the first of February wherever the Lord leads. He feels keenly the need of special divine help and spends much time weeping and praying for God to lead. Join him in prayer, will you?

Rev. and Mrs. Ingersoll, your very efficient high school teachers here, have begun the new term in their department. Rev. Rogers and I will have our first term examinations the last week of this month and the college second term will begin with registration day February 2. Send us more young people as well as your prayers and finance and this Reformed Baptist center of Christian training will do things for God and souls.

Mrs. Rogers, Mrs. Fernley, and Miss Brander are kept busy and all they do fits into the Lord's work. There is good fellowship and cooperation among the faculty and helpers.

We appreciate so much the vegetables and fruit that have been given by some of the charges. During the hunting season, the Cann brothers shot and gave a deer to the school which greatly helped our meat problem. If anybody can send us some more potatoes, meat, eggs or anything good to eat, please start it this way and we will be so glad.

Come to visit your school and I am sure that you will go home rejoicing that God has a holiness center here. When you see our students with the shine of heaven on their faces and some hands raised toward heaven as they sing,

"I'll go where you want me to go, dear Lord, Over mountain or plain or sea;

I'll say what you want me to say, dear Lord, I'll be what you want me to be",

you will sense that God is one with us.

As this, my first letter in these columns, comes to you, it bears the tokens of our deep interest in the work of the Lord and also our earnest request for your prayers and support.
