# THE NEW TRURO PROPERTY



Above is a picture of the new property at Truro, N. S., recently purchased. It is a beautitul possession located in the heart of Truro, a thriving town of 10,000 or more inhabitants. The lot is 185 x 165 and the church building is surrounded by a beautiful green bordered by fine shade trees. The building itself is a splendid plant and in excellent repair. It contains a fine auditorium, pastors's study, choir room, prayer room, cloak room, and a larger room for prayer meeting use. There is a full-sized basement under the building with a fine cement floor and wall sheathed and painted. On the second floor of the building there is a fine apartment which serves as pastor's residence. There are five rooms and a bath, with hardwood floors in all rooms except the bath room. This is a beautiful property and affords us a wonderful opportunity for service in the hub town of Nova Scotia.

A fine Gospel work has been carried on in this building for more than twenty years under Evangelist F. G. Strickland. Brother Strickland has been greatly blessed of the Lord in his ministry in Truro and we pray that the soul-saving work which has been carried on under his ministry will continue as we take up the work.

This property was purchased at a cost of \$20,000 to us. More than double this amount was offered by a secular organization but the offer was refused as the owner desired that the ministry of the Gospel be continued in the building.
