A moving camera is to be purchased for the Foreign Missions Society. The cost of same to be borne by the general fund of the Young People's Society. It is hoped that Brother and Sister Parks will use this during their stay in Africa, and bring back to us moving pictures of the work there.

History was made this year as the first D. V. B. S. took place during the mornings of the camp meeting. A great crowd of children assembled in a large tent situated on the Rockdale property, every morning at 9.30. We hope to tell you more about this in the next issue of The Highway.

Youth Camp began on Tuesday, July 19th.

The number enrolled was the largest yet, the figure being about 90. It was our privilege to be present at the first evening service of the camp and feel that the workers are men of God. We trust much good resulted as the camp closed.

Thanks to the hard work of Arthur Ingersoll, the camp ground had somewhat of a new look this year. Leaves that had covered the ground for many years were cleared away, the walks were lined with stones, and a great number of smaller jobs were completed. It will take a number of years to make the grounds as beautiful as they could be, but we believe with special efforts each spring and summer, we shall see a definite change for the better.
