SORRY, YOU'RE TOO LATE

Yes, you're too late to take in this year's Youth Camp. It's past. Tuesday, July 19th, was registration day. We had a record enrollment of over 90 students. I understand all but two counties of New Brunswick were represented besides Nova Scotia and Maine. There were young people from at least five denominations. Especially noticeable this year was the large number of new young people. We count it a privilege to have had the opportunity of making so many new contacts with the gospel of full salvation.

I think we may feel that Youth Camp, 1949, was very successful. Many factors contributed to its success. The workers put all that they could into the camp; their duties were performed conscientiously and they showed a personal interest in the welfare of the students.

God favored us with two weeks of ideal weather. Perhaps the factor that figured most in the success of the camp was the attitude of the young people. All the necessary duties were performed cheerfully; there were no "Discipline problems." Even more important than this was the spirituality of the group. The young people got under the load of the services and many of the conversions were in direct answer to prayer. It wasn't at all an uncommon thing to hear prayer meetings in the dormitories at all times of the day. The students really carried the load and made it their camp.

For those who are not familiar with the schedule at youth camp, it might be of interest to briefly outline the day's activities. The day begins at 7.30 a. m., with the rising bell. The

morning includes devotional periods and two three-quarter hour class periods. During the afternoon there is a music class, a Bible class period and supervised recreation. Each evening there is an evangelistic service in the tabernacle. At 10.30 lights out and the day is over.

Our Bible teacher this year was Dr. Peter Wiseman, of Detroit, Michigan, U. S. A. The first morning class he gave to a study of the life and missionary journies of St. Paul. During this period he also gave brief outlines of several of Paul's Epistles. Dr. Wiseman made available to the students a book entitled, "Search the Scriptures," which should be a help to us in reading and studying the Scriptures at any time. In the second class Dr. Wiseman spoke on the theology of sanctification. Surely all of us will be stronger and better holiness people for having attended this class. During the afternoon class we studied the life and teaching method of Christ. We were indeed grateful for the privilege of having had this great teacher with us this year.

The evangelistic team, Paul Currie and Albert Lane, conducted the evening services. Many of the unsaved young people responded to the invitations to be saved. It was also encouraging to see some earnest seekers for sanctification. May God bless these souls and give them grace to live holiness back at home and among their friends.

The benefits of such a camp as this are evident. Young Christians are encouraged in one another. It is a time of real growth and establishment. At Youth Camp we are given the opportunity of reaching some young people with the gospel invitation who know little of the ways of salvation. It is remarkable the number of young people who were at camp this year who had had no previous contact with our denomination and who, due to location, will have no continued immediate contacts. Yet God has wrought a work of salvation in their hearts while at Beulah, that they will be able to live out day by day as they live at home. May these seeds germinate and grow new holiness churches in new communities.

Yes, you're too late to attend Youth Camp, 1949, but it's certainly not a bit too early to begin planning to come next year.
