As a result of this sale and the government plan, hundreds of Zulus will be brought under the teaching and influence of our missionaries.

Another matter approved was the proposal to build a new hotel-dormitory at Riverside camp-ground. Plans are being laid to begin work on the project in the spring. A special committee appointed to supervise the work is headed by Rev. F. A. Dunlop, chairman of the Alliance Building Committee. Other representatives are Otis Ames and Lic. Burrell Kimball, of Fort Fairfield, Lester Todd, representing our Perth Church, Ted Walton, of Presque Isle, and Frank Jewett, of Bloomfield.

Rev. Nathan Cohen Beskin, Jewish evangelist, is assisting Rev. H. E. Mullen and our Church at Fredericton in a special campaign which began New Year's Day and will continue over Jan. 15th.

A revival campaign opens at Moncton, N. B., Jan. 15th. The pastor, Rev. E. W. Tokley, will preach, and Deverne Mullen will be song leader and soloist.

PRESQUE ISLE CHURCH DEDICATION

Sunday, Nov. 27th, was a "red-letter day" in the history of the Reformed Baptist Church of Presque Isle, Maine. On that day the new church building, erected under the aggressive leadership of the pastor, Rev. H. O. McGeorge, was dedicated to the worship and service of God.
