the church building. The wall at the rear was built, and what was already under was cemented, as no mortar had been previously put in the wall. Then the entire interior, including the seats, was repainted and opaque glass put in the lower window sashes. New linoleum carpet was laid on the aisle and platform and new upholstery put on desk and chairs. Later, cement steps were built for the front entrance. Beside these, new aluminum offering plates were purchased and fifty song books. We have now a splendid and comfortable little church to worship in. All this was accomplished like in Nehemiah's time, "Because the people had a mind to work."

From Nov. 8 to 20 we engaged in special meetings with Rev. J. W. Turpel as evangelist. We saw no great community revival, but attendance was fairly good, and God's blessing was upon every service. The church was really edified, and a few crossed the Jordan and were sanctified wholly. Others were definitely helped and some wanderers returned to the fold. We are having good seasons of refreshing in all of our churches on this circuit. We covet the prayers of God's people for the work here.

We have had a good Quarterly over the last week-end with the folk of District No. 1 here in our church at Millville. The evening before, there would be a knock at the door, one of us would open the door, there would be one or more standing there, with a big wide smile on their faces and without hardly a word would walk right into the pantry and leave all kinds of curiously shaped parcels there, a donation amounting to about \$12.00.

Let the pastor and his family say to the folks of Millville Church and of the Circuit a great big "Thank You" at this time. The folks here are taking steps to install a bath-room in the parsonage. Also to put a rock-wool cap on the parsonage, to keep its eves warm.
