NO PEACE IN SIGHT

"Peace on earth, good will toward men," is God's will for the nations, and the means whereby His will may be fulfilled has been given to mankind in the Person of His Son. But the United Nations is trying to promote peace on earth by other means entirely. Is it any wonder the organization is ineffective?

The \$65,000,000 buildings which will be the United Nations headquarters in New York are beginning to take shape—but the nations are spending more on preparations for war than at any other "time of peace" in history.

The United States, which spent two per cent of its national income for defense before the last war, is now applying six per cent of its income to that purpose.

Great Britain expends twice as much in arms production as she did before World War II. France has increased its arms' budget tremendously. Sweden, Norway, and Denmark, who prior to the war spent practically nothing for defense, now have large military appropriations for war.

Holland's arms' budget is seven times as high as it was ten years ago. Russia, who prior to 1940 spent ten per cent of its national income for military purposes, now has an arms' appropriation of seventeen per cent.

The gentle dove of peace can find no place to set her feet in the nations' capitals; but she finds a resting place in the hearts of God's people, for it is written, "The Lord will bless his people with peace" (Psa. 29:11).—Pentecostal Evangel.

LETTERS FROM OUR PASTORS

Black's Harbour, N. B.

Dear Highway Friends,

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to God, that we find ourselves writing our first letter as pastor and wife from our first church. More than three months have slipped by since we began our ministry in this place, and God has been very present with us.

When we arrived at Black's Harbour the new parsonage was not quite finished, so we abode in the home of one of the church members. We helped a little in putting the final touches to the parsonage and we were living in it within three weeks.

We were very surprised one night to receive a large delegation from the church. My wife and I were working, she in the kitchen and I in the bedroom, when a knock was heard on the door and in walked a number of people carrying different shaped parcels. We wondered just who was who, for as yet we were unacquainted with some of them. Anyway we soon put our tools away and were enjoying Christian fellowship as well as unwrapping the various parcels which contained food and other useful articles.

In August we held our D.V.B.S., under the very capable leadership of Miss Eileen Flanders. This was Black's Harbour's first experience of a Bible School, and we believe it was very successful. Eighty-three students enrolled and we had an average attendance of 53. The boys and girls were taught the way of salvation in such a manner that suited their age groups. We are confident that this school achieved a great deal, and much good resulted from the same.

The need for Sunday School rooms in the basement of the church was urgent, so at a meeting of the church it was voted to build four class rooms. This was no sooner said than done. One of the men in the church gave his time to the building of them and they were completed within three days. He also equipped them with seats and shelves. They are an asset to the church and so much more convenient and helpful for the teachers and students.

Our Young People's work increases as the weeks go by. We have a fine group of young people who know how to pray, and to live the Christian life before the world. It is an inspiration to us all to see them regularly attending church and to hear them tell of the good things that God has done and is doing for them.

The Sunday services are proving to be God led. The spirit's power is felt from time to time and we have seen a number take the step of faith that has led them to the Saviour. The church here is in a state of revival and we are praying to the end that God will further show us how to lead men and women into the experience of salvation and sanctification. We have a big task but have a bigger God.
