## EPIDEMIC OF MURDER

The summer months are being marred by what may be called an epidemic of murder. Whether we call it an aftermath of war or trace it to alarmingly increasing consumption of alcoholic beverages, the results are terrifying.

Murder proceeds from the heart. Jesus taught, "You have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'Thou shalt not kill; and whoever kills shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that every one who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother, shall be liable to the council, and whoever says, 'You fool' shall be liable to the hell of fire." Matt. 5:22. (R.S.V.)—The apostle John wrote, "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death. Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer." I John 3:14-15. There are many outside of prison who are murderers for "whosoever hateth—is a murderer."

A better co-ordinated police force might help to deter the would-be murderer, but it would not correct the heart condition that leads to murder. We need to give heed to the old, old story of the Cross. As we look upon Jesus, the Son of God, dying there for us, we are convicted of sin, righteousness and judgment to come.
