The "gang spirit" is especially strong among teen-agers. It is a normal development in this period of life to want to do what the group is doing. This fact can be moulded and their energies channeled to great advantage.

But leadership is not always Christian. Then comes the test of character. Will he be swayed by the group or will he dare to stand alone? Will he have the courage of his convictions? Daniel did. He "purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's meat, nor the wine with which he drank." Dan. 1:8. He held to the teachings of the Mosaic law in spite of the surroundings pagan customs.

Our convictions should not just be "notions" for which we search for support in the Bible. Rather they should be the fruit of prayerful study of the Bible. We can know God's will. "Be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." Ro. 12:2. Having come to that knowledge let us "be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive." Eph. 4:14.

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#### TO EACH HIS WORK

On the other hand, at the age of seventy-six, Gipsy Smith was asked if he would retire. "Retire?" he said, "not I: I'm no extinct volcano. I will retire when God tells me to, by taking away my equipment, and not before."—Selected.

#### THE CHURCH'S SUPREME DUTY

It cannot escape the most careless observation that in the Pauline conception Christianity was, first of all, a mission. How tireless was the great apostle, how increasing his efforts to build where Christ was not named!
