Dear Brethren in Christ:

I am writing you to give you a picture of the world challenge of the Bible Society and to urge that you give all possible support, encouragement and leadership if necessary that the work may be supported in the very best manner possible in your Church or Churches and the communities they serve.

There is a great, probably unprecedented, world need and call for the Bible today. Our times have been called the "greatest Christian opportunity since the age of the apostles".

The drop in the purchasing power of money (\$1.00 now will buy only about what 40c would ten or fifteen years ago) makes it necessary to expand our income.

To accomplish our share in this advance, all of which I feel sure you will agree is vital, we should increase our givings by at least 25% for the next four years. (Our share for Canada is £100,000, say \$311,000).

Literature, collecting cards and receipt books are in the hands of the Branch Secretary. Please boost the canvass all you can, and assist the local officers in seeing that it is organized as effectively as possible. Your active participation will be greatly appreciated indeed.

We would again suggest this year that the last Sunday in September be Bible Society Sunday, and that suitable emphasis be given the needs of the work if at all convenient to your programme. If not, it would be much appreciated if this were done some Sunday before the canvass is made.
