awaits them, when "instead of well set hair baldness." Isa. 3:24 reads to three worlds. God is faithful to his warning. "If ye walk contrary unto me, . . . Then will I also walk contrary unto you, and will punish you. Lev. 26:21-24.

In my dealings with souls I have known of three parties praying definitely against God's revealed will for them in the dressing of their hair. Each of them received the same leadings to comb their hair straight back, without any attempt to add to their beauty by aping the world in the dressing of the hair.

Two of these three cried and fumed and retorted to God, as if He had asked of them a griveous injustice. The younger of the three walked in the light, and for a season tasted the power of God, that puts His glory beaming through her countenance until her very presence convicted the ungodly. Sad to say, that under the influence of a compromising church she looked back, as did Lot's wife and today is grinding in the prison house with her eyes out.

"But if a woman have long hair, it is a glory to her; for her hair is given her for a covering." I. Cor. 11:15. Nothing is small that God through His Word put His finger on and says, "Thou shalt not." This fact was proven in the life of a young lady in W. Va., who under Holy Ghost conviction faced God's rebuke on bobbing her hair. She walked against the light and bobbed her hair, and in a few weeks died, screaming until her parents could not stay in the room. Her sad wail was, "I see my hair burning in hell!" Modern slacks, etc., worn by women today are abomination to God, though the wearer might be hundreds of miles from the haunts of mortals. The eye that never slumbers is noting the disobedience to His plain command. "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, neither shall a man put on woman's garments: for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God." Deut. 22:5.

We can sell out the Christ for "the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life," but we cannot escape pay day, "For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil."
