great need of the Church taking up the question of Superannuation more heartily for those who had spent their lives in the cause of the Church and now by reason of age or infirmity were unable to carry on. They had sacrificed everything and should now receive enough at least to relieve them of financial cramps.

We have not travelled far and wide for our task has kept us in a narrow range geographically; but there are some things that have come under our notice. There is a great similarity between the Church and the home. If there is one thing that has grieved us it is to see a mother or father who had brought up a family to manhood and womanhood and now they are feeble and it seems are only in the road. This does happen. We have seen it and it gave us a pain in the heart. But we have seen the old folk tenderly cared for and patiently loved to their final passing. We have seen the daughter-in-law care for mother-inlaw as thoughtfully as if she were her own mother. We did appreciate this so much. There are not enough Ruths.

The religion of Jesus has changed homes and put heaven there instead of hell. It has also spread its influence out till it has reached Government House and they have sought to provide for needy old age. This may be comparatively skimpy but what would many today do without it? The Lord bless the Governments. Is it possible that the Church may say, "Thank you, Government, you have reheved us."

We can look back over the years in our own Church and we have had those who gave of their best to the Ministry and then there came the breaking with infirmity and there was forced retirement from the work they so dearly loved. There was no superannuation and they have had to make out the best they could. It was without complaint. Does anyone ever inquire how "Nellie" is getting along? Then there was a good brother and his wife forced into retirement because of a physical condition. He was placed or rather took up a garden lot and, eked out an existence-this was before Old Age Pensions, and before they were old enough to receive. Now they are more comfortable since the O. A. Pension has come into being. They are blest, and he is a great war-

son, I wouldn't want my Lord to come and find His pound buried in a luxurious automobile, or some of the luxuries we find in so many homes these days. The main reason they are there is because the neighbors started to buy and we can't be left behind if we have to mortgage our whole future and spend the Lord's money for things which are not meat. At the same time, if I can see ahead at all, I can see anarchy in the near future. For that reason and so many others as pressing, I feel that we Christians must at least plant the seed in heathen countries, so that the natives will be able to evangelize their own people if it so happens that Christ delays his coming and help across the seas is cut off. We also must remember that we must furnish the tools if our missionaries are to do the work we expect of them. Surely our people can spare some extra money, if they can give their lives as a sacrifice gladly."

Surely the generosity of this brother's gift gives him a right to speak as he does, and surely his example should spur us on to more sacrificial giving than ever before.
