THE TEMPTATION OF JESUS

It appears evident that Mark's record describes the forty days siege, while Matthew describes the final siege. It was after Jesus "had fasted forty days and forty nights", the devil came to Him (Matt. 4:2, 3). When He was hungry and tired, the devil made his supreme effort to down our Lord.

Much has been said on the probability of our Lord yielding. It seems to us, however, it may be of more importance to note that He did not fail; that He won out; and because He did not yield, we need not. He won that we may win!

Our Lord's temptation covered practically the whole field of temptation; covered it in such a way that He can succor those who are tempted, and covered it in such a way that through Him we can overcome. He was tempted to distrust God, "Command that these stones be made bread". He was tempted to presumption, "Cast thyself down". He was tempted to devil worship, "Fall down and worship me". He was tempted to worldly ambition, "All this will I give thee".

We are told that during the temptation of our Lord, the devil appeared probably in human form, that our Lord "dispersed the assaults of the adversary like smoke". According to Matthew Henery, this is the story of a famous duel, fought hand to hand between Michael and the dragon . . . our Lord comes off a conqueror and so secures not only comfort but conquest at least to all His followers. "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love Him" (James 1:12).
