A PREACHER WHO CLEANED UP A CITY

In Italy, the City of Florence was desperately wicked when Savonarola came to it as a priest. But Savonarola was more than a priest. He was a prophet of God to his city and age. He feared no man. He delivered his soul in the most burning sermons that the people of Florence ever heard. His sermons produced the greatest agitation in his hearers and often the people would fall into paroxysms of weeping over their sins.

When Savonarola began to preach, Florence was given up to extravagance, profligacy and libertinism. Even the clergy were unbelieving and licentious. Savonarola's invectives were terrible and he made many enemies but as he hurled his anathemas against wickedness thousands thronged to hear him and in a few years Florence was cleaned up by this preacher of righteousness.

It is said in order to expiate their sense of awful guilt the people fasted to such an extent as to beggar the butchers; and profane books, paintings, statuary and tapestries were burned as the whole city turned to God. Savonarola cleaned up the City of Florence but eventually the Pope and Rome visited their vengeance upon him and Savonarola was hung and his ashes scattered to the winds.
