glorifies God more than for us to stand amid the fiery darts of the wicked and hurl them back.

There is a fine story told by Mrs. Jameson in her history of the early saints and martyrs. A Roman maiden was approached by a wicked man who sought her love and employed a noted magician to overcome her unwillingness, and poison her mind. Through this malign influence she was assailed by thoughts and imaginations of evil that had never before occurred to her, and in great distress she began to condemn herself as being guilty of great wickedness. She went to one of the apostolic fathers for counsel and learned from him, to her great joy, that these were the devil's thoughts and not hers; that if she would resist them in the name of the Lord and bid them depart, she would be delivered. It was even so, and the wicked man who had thrown over her this cloud of evil became convicted, and came to her to confess his sin and ask her forgiveness and prayer. When the devil brings his ill-favored children to our door, we do not need to adopt them. They are the devil's brats, and we can simply turn them back to him.

The Apostle tells us that on the cross the Lord Jesus "spoiled principalities and powers," and "made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it." He has hung up Satan as a scaregrow that all the world may know that he is despoiled and defeated.
