Dear Highway Friends,

We greet you from this field of need and opportunity.

Christmas will soon be here, so we take this opportunity to wish you all a time of blessing for this season, and true happiness for the New Year. Already we have received some parcels from Canada and appreciate your kindness in thus remembering us and also the poor people that we are trying to win for our Christ.

Last Sunday we had some special meetings in the Myeni section, and on Sunday we enjoyed a communion service with two old women who have been faithful Christians for many years. Myra had picked out two dresses that had come in a parcel, and you should have been there to see the joy of these two old Christians. The dresses were several sizes too large, as both of these women have been seriously ill and are very thin but they did not mind that. One of them said, this was their wedding day, and right there they put these dresses on, over the old garments that they had on. They would use them for this special service that had come to their home section.

A week ago Wednesday, I attended the funeral of little Julia. This little girl was about six years' old, and for half of her little life she had been ill. It seems that she fell from a tree when about three years' old and her back was injured and then it seems that T.B. set in. She was sent away to hospital and received treatment, but was not cured. Finally deep sores developed and her little body wasted away and she suffered very much pain. We tried to have prayers in that kraal as frequently as possible, and to find some things to help Julia to be more comfortable and happy. A few days before she went home to be with the Lord, I took down some of the Christmas parcels that Sister Gladys Kierstead had sent for the family, and Myra had a few to add to these, and Myra took one of the children's toys for Julia. Her father told me that as she neared the end she repeatedly asked them to pray. On one occasion she got them down on their knees five times, so the father felt that he had exhausted his prayers, and finally he appealed to Jesus to pray for her. So it seems that the message that Julia left for us was "PRAY."

In the ups and downs of this Missionary work we have recently sustained about the hardest blow yet: one of our trusted Native Elders has fallen to the wiles of the Devil, appealing through the opposite sex. So here is a new gap in our ranks that will be hard to fill. And we must needs pray unto the Lord to care for the sheep of His flock that were under this man's care and will be greatly tempted to give up by this fall of their leader. This blow is harder for the work to stand, (as you all can readily see), than would be the victorious home going, of a person like this. We need to pray for this man too.

We are glad to learn that two, instead of one new Missionaries are about to come out to the field. May the Lord bless them as they complete their preparations for leaving the Homeland and loved ones, and face the unknown future, giving their lives in glad sacrifice for the Master.

We are glad to learn of the safe arrival of Grace in the homeland, we thank the Lord for His protection. And it is a source of joy to

learn of the companion that George has found, since his going back to Canada. May the Lord bless them.

The message that the Lord has given me for today is about His going away and coming back again; and of our believing in Him and believing also in God. As I have been thinking about this wonderful passage in John 14, I was thinking how necessary it was for Jesus to find a place for us, to "prepare a place", for His followers. For the Christians are not happy about this present place they have to live in. They do not enjoy most of what they see and hear coming from their fellow beings who have chosen to "love this world and the things that are in the world." If it had been possible to divide this world into two sections, according to population, and according to the second birth and the second work of grace. Having one portion for the godless and another for those who love God and obey Him, how much better, it would seem, that people could get along. And yet that never has, nor ever will happen till after the judgment when God does the sorting Himself. There are so many ties back and forth and so much subtlety in human nature that the plan would soon fail. Yet how wonderful it is to be able to look ahead. To know that there is a future for the people of God, and what a wonderful future it is! May the Lord help us to fully prepare for this New Heaven and New Earth.
