Last night I was dreaming about Beulah Camp. We trust that this year's Camp has been outstanding in glory to God and blessing to man.

Our Altona Quarterly seems to have been outstanding in two important features: the starting of prayer pledgers for revival, and dealing with different matters concerning this Missionary work which, if they are properly solved will lead to new victories and progress of the work. In connection with the need of prayer for REVIVAL of the Lord's work, one chief difficulty that seemed very apparent, was lack of sufficient worker. So we decided to make this a matter of prayer too: for the work is the Lord's and He can solve even this problem.

It seemed like a great miracle to have Sister Kierstead with us, at the Altona Quarterly. We were sorry that she had had a cold that prevented her from attending some of the meetings, however the fact that she was able to get back to Altona was a source of wonder, and cause for praise to God.

We are glad at last to report that the building on our new site at Lujowwane, is in progress. To secure the necessary building materials was one difficulty, and to have these transported to the site was another difficulty; but both of these have all but been completed now. By the end of this month the walls should be up. One man asked me if we would be having school in the new building in August, so I told him we should not be too early in our forecasts and hopes. He is the one who kindly loaned us his little stone house, that we have been using for our school room. It is rather small, and primitive but we appreciate his co-operation that gave us even this small, dark room to teach in.

There are two places in the Transvaal that need churches built, as soon as possible. One is at Ntungwini, one of our oldest outposts and at Msobotsheni, one of the newest ones. May the Lord supply the means to erect these places of worship.

The work among the children and young people seems to be gaining ground slowly, and I feel that this is a good sign. With increasing D.V.B.S. and Sunday School work being done, we should see some of our children and young people saved and established. If this is done then we shall have good hope for the future, otherwise our prospects are rather dark.

The Mission field needs about what the work in the homeland needs. Only the work in the homeland is more advanced in its pro-

gress. The work out here is trying to head in the same direction. We need a school for our future preachers and women workers. May the Lord open the way for such an institution to be established. It seems rather significant that some of your Missionaries out here at the present time are trained teachers. We need evangelists and a method of holding meetings over a long period of time, two or three weeks in one place. May the Lord supply these needs soon. We are glad for all who have a deep interest in this work on the foreign field. We are glad that you are praying and working for the salvation of souls of these underprivileged people. Those who are so interested have quite a lot to thank the Lord for, in what has been accomplished. They have even more to ask the Lord for in what yet remains to be done.

"Invest for ETERNITY" is a good slogan for the people of the Lord. The world calls us fools for what we are doing for the Lord. Spending our lives for a thankless and a fruitless job, is about what they would call it: but those who have had their eyes opened, those who have had their understandings enlightened, according to heaven's standards, have a different idea of these investments. What a tremendous difference there is between the children of this Godless world, and the children of the Kingdom of heaven. Seeking money, and education, and worldly popularity and fame, takes up most of their time; and of course pleasure seeking, is about item number one on their programmes. Building for eternity, working for the glory of God, and for the salvation of souls and for the improvement of the state, and conditions of our fellow men, seems like a strange and life-wasting pursuit, to these people of this world. May the Lord help us to go all out to do business for Him, and may we see the revival that we are beginning to pray for: in the homeland and on this foreign field. The world of today stands out as a tremendous need, with no solution to it: so far as man is concerned. All the discoveries and inventions of modern man has done nothing to improve the heart trouble of the world. Sin and selfishness dominate the most of the inhabitants of this world. Jesus is the only solution to this heart disease and His salvation is the only cure for fallen man. His shed blood is able to bring pardon and complete cleansing, and His grace is sufficient to put any fallen person back on their feet again. Praise His name for ever.

## THE FORMIDABLENESS OF JESUS CHRIST

The stone which the builders rejected, the same is become the head of the corner? Whosoever shall fall upon that stone shall be broken; but on whomsoever it shall fall, it will grind him to powder (Luke 20:17-18).
