I suppose that our school is as much interdenominational as some schools which claim to be so. Seven Protestant denominations are represented by our student body. Having twenty-nine young people enrolled, our own denomination is the most largely represented. Our sister denomination, the Nazarene, has seven students in attendance. Represented by one each are the United Church of Canada, the Free Baptist Church, the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, the People's Church of Truro, and the Friends.

To most of our students Nova Scotia is a strange land. From across the Bay come twenty-two New Brunswickers; four each from Black's Harbour and Moncton; three each from Millville and Salem; two from Seal Cove; one each from Doaktown, Woodward's Cove, Victoria Corner, Wood Island, Lower Brighton, and Fredericton. From across the Strait of Northumberland, come three Islanders, representing Alberton and O'Leary. From across the Border come three Yankees: One from Jonesport, Maine; one from Presque Isle, Maine; one from Newport, Rhode Island. The natives, if we may call them such, number thirteen. They are divided as follows: four from Truro; two each from Yarmouth and Havelock; one each from Port Maitland, Sandford, Londonderry, Halifax, and Pleasant Lake.

"He Has You On His Heart"

On the wall hangs a motto, and I see it again and again during the day: "Casting all your care upon Him; for he careth for you." But of late there comes to me a sweeter rendering: "For He has you on His heart." Do you know that oftentimes we are surprised how wondrously the grace and presence of God keeps us? There are circumstances that are adverse; folks oftentimes disappoint us, but we are kept. Grace that saves is abundant and satisfying; but grace that keeps when the pressure is one hundred pounds to the square inch, is almost beyond our conception; and yet we know by experience that it is sufficient. The peace, the calm that comes to the soul when hell is raging, is not of ourselves, it is of Him. "There is a place where spirits blend"-His Spirit and ours; there is an infinite calm the world knows nothing of, and it comes to the soul that is accustomed to the presence chamber of God. Satan may delay the answer, but faith in God says: "It is all right; He never has failed me, He never will, and never can fail me"; in due time will come the assurance: "Fear not . . . for from the first day that thou didst set thine heart to understand . . . thy words were heard, and I am come for thy words (because of them). The enemy withstood me, "but now I am come to make thee understand." (Dan. 10:12-14).

Harmony with God brings a knowledge of His will. Jesus said so, and it is in His will that we should have peace. "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God." "Faith is the victory."
