QUARTERLY MEETING REPORT


The Quarterly Meeting of District No. 4 was held at the Wood's Harbour Church, November 15 to 18.

Our students have planned futures. It is amazing that so many of them have definite objectives. Of course objectives are more common to Christian young people, and a Christian school has a way of fostering objectives in its own sons and daughters.

Around forty per cent of our students are planning on entering Christian service: ten are preparing for the ministry; six for missionary service; one for children's work. Such numbers will swell the ranks of our small band of workers and enable us to push back our frontiers at home and abroad.

The next profession most highly favoured is that of teaching, having six young devotees. Four girls are planning to enter nursing. Two boys have inclinations toward the medical field. Two girls are planning to be stenographers. One literary enthusiast is aspiring to be a journalist; another student is going to be a farmer; and one's ambitions soar to be a pilot. Seven students are undecided as to future vocations. We trust that a few will turn to domestic pursuits.

Our students present many contrasts: there is the one who has not reached his teens and the one who is in his thirties; the high-school student and the Bible-school student; the single and the married; the Christian and the non-Christian; the disciplined and the nondisciplined; the serious and the carefree. The leadership and discipline of such a group, having differing background, ethical standards, and church associations, are, modestly speaking, not easy. Problems are not frequent; they are continual. The burden of the physical care, the intellectual development, and the moral and spiritual betterment of such a group is incomparable. It is the most comprehensive of responsibilities.

Our students are the source of our problems, but also the source of our praise. It is a privilege to train them, mould them, and inspire them. It is a joy to note their intellectual ability, their character development, their spiritual attainment, and then, finally, their consecrated service. The words "Let no man despise thy youth" were spoken to a youth. Often I have thought that the same words might be spoken in behalf of youth. May God give to His leaders and people a great appreciation of our young people.

The Quarterly Meeting of District No. 2 convened with the church at Londonderry.

The opening message of the Quarterly was brought by S. W. Ingersoll from the text, "The love of Christ constraineth us." Friday evening Rev. A. L. Stairs spoke from the theme, "The glory has departed."

The business meeting was held on Saturday, 2.30 p.m. In this service it was requested that the secretary, in his report to The Highway, urge all the churches of the District to include in their reports, the Sunday School. Reports from this branch of the work has been neglected. Brother Blinn brought a good holiness message in the evening service.

The Sunday services were times of blessing. The love feast was led by the pastor of the church, which was followed by the preaching service at which Miss Miriam Sanders was the speaker. Rev. H. S. Mullen preached in the afternoon, and Rev. B. D. Price brought the closing message of the Quarterly.

A great spirit prevailed in all the services, and much blessing was upon the people. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!
