Dear Highway:

Greetings in Jesus' precious name. Possibly an account of my travelogue since Beulah might interest you.

At Grand Manan I spent three most enjoyable weeks with some friends of the early days when we made our home there. Changes have taken place; trees cut down to widen the road so it could be paved; new buildings have gone up and, when I went to church I missed the faces and testimonies of the saints "who have gone on before." I had the privilege of speaking in both North Head and Seal Cove Churches, and also at Wood Island, mainly on the work which God has blessed in Africa. I was blessed to fellowship with those dear people, who have held the ropes while we sought to save perishing souls in Africa. Twice I went raspberrying. Oh, to once more be able to inhale the wonderful spicy air of the beautiful woods. How I used to long to be able to in Africa, where parts of the country are barren of natural trees.

From there I proceeded to Riverside, in company with Brother and Sister Ralph Sabine and family. We dropped in at the parsonage at Calais and surprised Brother and Sister R. Parks, who were just getting settled. After visiting at another home, our next stop was Houlton. We stayed over night at Sister Sabine's parents' home and visited her sister and arrived at Riverside in time for supper.

It was great to be at another Camp Meeting and to see the improvements, the new hotel, etc. But I sensed the need of more of the spirit of burden and prayer.

After Riverside Camp I spent a week at Gordonsville; had a brief, delightful visit with the Misses Sterritt at Hartland, and attended two of the Glassville Tent Meetings where God was working mightily.

My next stop was Presque Isle, where I stayed until the close of the Revival Meetings with Rev. Bona Fleming. Brother Fleming was at his best at Presque Isle. His messages were wonderful and great good was accomplished as was reported in The King's Highway. But preceding and during the meetings a volume of prayer went up to the throne of grace. Before each service old and young met in the basement for prayer. That doubtless was the secret of the blessing.

At Presque Isle I was amazed to be asked so often for stories, etc., of Africa. In practically every service or prayer meeting either a Zulu song was asked for or a story, etc. The Sunday School as a group or individual classes were addressed too. I wish you could have heard the prayers for Africa after those talks! Then seen the numerous articles of clothing from men, women, boys, girls and babies which were brought in, by the arm load, bagfuls and boxes. Many parcels were sent to Africa together with some money to help pay duty on the other end. The children gave glad-

Sister Symonds. I have so enjoyed the Christian fellowship with the pastors and their wives and seeing the good work which they are doing in the homeland. Also their interest in the Mission work and what the ladies are planning to make this winter, when the snow begins to fly, to send to Africa.

On my way home I stopped off at Moncton to speak in the monthly Missionary Meeting there, and the following evening talked to the Junior Young Peoples' group.

I trust my talks will inspire hearts to pray more earnestly for the work in Africa, and to do more than ever for the extension of God's Kingdom at home and in the foreign fields.

Here are some of the remarkable ways in which folk responded to the voice of God during my visits:

A young woman asked to "adopt" a native baby in Africa—to send her clothes from time to time.

Another has "adopted" a young school girl to do the same for her.

A number of boys and girls have taken up the plan of writing encouraging letters to the young struggling Christian boys and girls who have learned some English.

Strangers (of another Denomination) at the close of one service asked me for an address so as to send out parcels from their Missionary Society to our field.

Last year a couple denied themselves a delicious turkey dinner for Christmas and put the carefully saved ten dollars towards Missions.

And, last but not least, a young man told me he had decided against buying himself a second new suit and was going to send the equivalent of its price thus: 25 dollars, to Home Missions and 25 dollars to Foreign Missions! That is what I like to see! Not just barely paying the tithe (God's money) but making Him see how much we love Him, by denying ourselves something and giving something extra of that which we had laid aside for ourselves, etc. We will not be the losers by it—ah, no! Now we shall be blessed, and in Eternity wish we had done far more.

Oh, let it not be said of us: "I was hungered and ye gave me no meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink; I was a stranger and ye took me not in; naked, and ye clothed me not; sick, and in prison, and ye visited me not." But let us do our utmost by prayer and giving and doing, that labourers may be sent out and the work supported and souls saved before it is too late.
