Those who hesitate to believe in the wonderful works of Jesus, who cannot reconcile their experience in life with His death and resurrection, stand face to face with the stupendous change He wrought in His disciples. From the depth of despair when they saw Him die, they were roused to a pitch of enthusiasm which captured the world. And this change occurred in a few weeks. Between the crucifixion and the first preaching of the great news of salvation, a gap of 50 days, something happened, a miracle so vast, a movement so vital, that it not only removed from the timorous and shrinking followers of Jesus the shadow of fear, but their character was altered, and through them the whole history of the world.

At His death the disciples passed out of sight; they hid themselves behind closed doors for fear of the Jews. Fifty days later they stood in the midst of the multitudes who had witnessed the death of Jesus, to proclaim the great fact of His resurrection. The announcement of the fact ran like fire through the populace; a new light streamed into their minds; a new force moved in their hearts. New life, new joy, the victory over sin and death, came through His triumph. Many people who had watched Jesus die believed all that the disciples said about His resurrection.
