#### QUARTERLY MEETING

# PLANNING A VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

In planning a Daily Vacation School, one has to do a great deal of organizing. One leader has suggested the theme for this year to be "Greater Heights". It certainly presents to us a challenge. This year, as we choose our objectives, let us work toward them with determination. Make these objectives a matter of earnest prayer both in departmental groups and individually.

As we organize for this year's school let us, as members of the local churches, begin early and plan well. First, contact your pastor and be sure he is brought in on the project at an early date. His support and council are valuable. He is frequently the best person to coordinate the work planned by the V. B. S. committee and church board, if the school is sponsored by the church. The children have a great deal of love for their pastor and like to think of him as their great leader.

In every successful enterprise there is someone who shoulders the load and stays under the burden until the job is done. That is the role of your Bible School Director. Choose her carefully and prayerfully. The director must have initiative, patience and administrative ability. She must have a keen love for children and for God.

Enlisting your teaching staff is another important step. In selecting teachers for various age groups experience is valuable, but willingness is more important. Many earnest Christian housewives can do an excellent teaching job. Do not be afraid to ask people to teach, and do not be too ready to take "no" for an answer. Challenge prospective teachers with the opportunity and privilege of leading boys and girls to know God personally. Emphasize to them the joy one has in realizing that God has used her to lead a child to Christ.

The dates of your school depend upon your local situation, but as a rule the two weeks right after the public school closes is best. Public school discipline habits will carry over into D.V.B.S., and fewer families are on vacation at that time thus your attendance is larger.

The curriculum of your Vacation Bible School should be chosen carefully. It is the heart of your school. It should be Biblecentered, easy to follow, timely, evangelistic, and well correlated. It must be a course of study that will teach the boys and girls how to live for Christ today; it must present the Bible as the inspired Word of their God; it must have a continual emphasis on a personal decision for Christ regardless of the age of the child. All activities, including handwork and recreation, should be built around the theme of your lesson. There are several fine courses of study one can secure for Vacation Bible School which meet the foregoing requirements. Get sample copies from several publishers, and then slect the course of study which fits the needs of your group.

To have a successful V. B. S., equipment must be checked and supplies ordered early. Things will run a lot more smoothly on the first day of school if teachers have had a chance to get thoroughly familiar with materials, to experiment with handwork and have models ready. Preparation is the key to success.

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
