Therefore, we read, "Wherefore, as the Holy Ghost saith, Today if ye will hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

It is possible to do this by an imperceptible process as when a piece of iron is heated and cooled again and again until it corrodes and falls to pieces; the temper has been burned out of it, and there is nothing left but dross. Gad says of some souls, "Reprobate silver shall men call them, because the Lord hath rejected them." We never can tell when for the last time we are saying No to God and He is giving us the final invitation. Just because the Spirit is so gentle, patient, long-suffering and forgetful of His own honour and glory, therefore God has said, "Of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden under foot the Son of God, and hath counted the blood of the covenant, wherewith he was sanctified, an unholy thing, and hath done despite unto the Spirit of grace?"
