#### WHY TEMPTATIONS?

We have considered previously the two important questions, viz.: What is Temptation and How are we Tempted. Today we will think about Overcoming Temptation.

#### The Necessity of Overcoming Temptation

The Christian experience offers to us the ability to Overcome the onslaughts of the enemy. There is a source from which Temptation comes, this source begins in the evil personality of the Devil. All temptations proceed from his influence that he breathes upon the sons of men. There is a source from which flows the power to resist temptation, this source is found to be in Christ Himself. Something has been lost from our experience. We do not have a clear conscience. Testimony and Witness is clouded. And let it be said right here that when we have fallen into temptation we have SINNED and no longer is our experience a Christian experience. We must seek the pardoning Grace of Christ and get His forgiveness for our sin. Until we have done this we cannot claim to be a Christian.

In the light of what has been said we see the necessity to Overcome Temptation. If Jesus Christ is living in our hearts through faith, if the Holy Spirit abides, if our conscience condemns us not, if our spirit Witness witnesses with Christ spirit that we are the Sons of God, if we know the power that keeps and satisfies us then WE CAN OVERCOME TEMPTATION. Everything is in our favour, all heaven is on our side.
