We find, in the earliest records of the progress of the Kingdom of God, that it was this work among individuals that counted largely. Of no less than seven of the twelve disciples it is told that they were brought to Christ individually, and the probability is that the others had similar experiences. Timothy, the Philippian jailor, the woman of Samaria, Nicodemus, and in fact almost all the conversions recorded in the New Testament were the result of individual effort.

The sermon has its place in the work of the Church, the Bible Class, the Young People's meeting, and the Prayer Meeting. The importance of public teaching and preaching cannot be overestimated, but where the bulk of Christians fail, miserably fail, is in leading others to Christ.

There are many who would gladly learn how this great and important work can be done. Then, why should we not learn? We have classes for Missionary Study, so why not have classes for the study of this most vital of all matters? If we are to fulfil the Lord's command given in Acts 1:8, and to be witnesses unto Him, the sooner we commence the better.

The best way to begin this work is to begin; the best way to begin is now. The only mistake we need really fear is the mistake of holding off.—Selected.
