THELMA ROSE WRITES FROM **INTERCESSION** CITY, FLORIDA

Dear Friends:

Greetings in the name of Jesus Whose Presence sustains and guides continually. I wish I could tell you of the way He has been directing my steps and providing each need as preparations continue for my going to Haiti.

The three weeks of my stay at the above address have passed so speedily, for each minute has been filled with necessary duties. In fact, upon my arrival I realized I was but half prepared, and while still waiting for the release of my visa from the Consul of Haiti in Miami, God has been giving me time to do those most necessary things that only a prospective missionary realizes.

I'm staying with a consecrated woman, Mrs. Ralph Welsh, who carries on the duties of a wife and mother, besides many other duties that come to one with a missionary vision. Sister Welsh has not spared herself in helping with shopping, and three times has gone with me in her car to Orlando, which is the nearest city, and about twenty-five miles distant.

There have been many things to buy, and by prayerful budgeting and searching we have found the best prices, and purchased equipment most necessary for housekeeping, also many articles needed for a clinic. Among the latter are an army cot, an oil stove and a large pressure-cooker to be used for sterilizing. There was a need for a "roll-away" bed and finally we were directed to one at a much reduced price. Brother Welsh is kindly crating

all these things ready for shipping.

It has been necessary to re-pack all my things and place a list of contents inside and outside of each trunk and crate, as well as keep a list for myself. This greatly aids at the time of declaring baggage at the customs office. To do the best job, I've re-packed about three times, and the last time with a little more sympathy for out-going missionaries. There has been such a little time for real preparation for only since August 15th have I been able to make definite plans. I'm still doing neecssary sewing, knowing there will be no time, or sewing machine to use, for such on the field. Thank God for His wonderful help in all these things. you, and star

On the first of September the hurried visit of less than two weeks was spent with my home folks. One evening a family reunion was arranged and enjoyed. My home church at Port Maitland held a farewell gathering on my last night there, and presented me with a gift of money. I feel confident of their prayerful support as God leads to a field of great need. God bless them.

On my last Sunday morning at the Nazarene Church, Cambridge, Mass., these good people

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people gave me a generous offering, suggesting a Bible as a gift.

Many of you have asked, "How long do you plan to stay in Haiti?" The American Immigration Office in Boston has answered that quite definitely. Being a Canadian citizen with only a visa for permanent residence in the U. S. A., it was necessary that I get a re-entry permit to return to this country from Haiti. This permit is extended for only one year, after which time it may be renewed at the American Consul at Haiti for one more year, at the end of which year I must return to the States and apply for another re-entry permit when leaving for Haiti.

For the benefit of those who wish to become better acquainted with the need in Haiti I will give the name and address from which the monthly paper of the Haiti Inland Mission may be subscribed.
