Ruth and I were married in 1921 as Reformed Baptist Missionaries at Hartland Mission Station.

My late wife was a good preacher, speaking the Zulu language fluently (as I do) and took the services when I was away at outposts.

A change came and we were obliged to take up private life, though my heart is still in mission work.

We had 31 years of true partnership, each strengthening the other in the Lord. She was ever a true helpmeet, and I do praise God for the wonderful experience of her co-operation.

After many years of illness, patiently borne, my dear wife passed to her eternal reward, peacefully, at home, lovingly cared for by our youngest daughter, Pearl (16 years) and myself, the last day of July.

My testimony is that I love the Lord, who has showed us His goodness all these years. My deepest ambition is to be in the center of His will, to do and to be what He would have me do!

I thank the Lord that He has given opportunity to serve Him, holding services in the Boksburg and Johannesburg jails and prison (as relieving chaplain) since coming to Boksburg in 1934-35.

We still get The Highway and rejoice in the progress of the mission work. We pray for all workers, including those newly arrived in South Africa.

We had the pleasure of meeting Mr. and Mrs. Parks during their stay at Altona Mission Station.

Please pray for us—I know some have all these years.

WHAT PARENTS ARE SAYING ABOUT BETHANY BIBLE COLLEGE

It was of special interest to note what Mrs. Gladys Kierstead had to say about Bethany Bible College in a summer issue of "The King's Highway." Many of our parents have faith in Bethany Bible College. They have sacrificed to send their children, not because there have not been schools nearer home, but because they felt that Bethany had "something to offer" which other schools did not have. In most cases, I think that faith has been rewarded. More than one parent has told the writer how much Bethany has done for his boy or girl. One Christian father remarked on graduation night that he felt that his daughter was "established" for life. How much does that mean to a parent? I can't answer; nor can you.

The Smith family of Port Maitland has illustrated its faith in Bethany by sending four of its members: Merle, Nina, Viola, and Hartley. Three of these could have attended a town high school and travelled home daily by school bus. Bethany was "first" choice.

A recent letter from a mother expresses her appreciation thus: "I continue to thank God for a school like Bethany. It is truly a privilege to send my son there and to have teachers whose lives are consecrated to God. He seems very contented and doing so much better spiritually. It is in answer to prayer. We have a truly wonderful Saviour."

As far as our parents are concerned (and they are quite important people), Bethany is making a vital contribution to the development of Christian youth.

This year a new heating plant for Bethany was imperative. We could postpone the project no longer, not only because of comfort and efficiency, but also because of the fire hazard involved. The Board of Bethany Bible College proceeded to procure the necessary equipment. The first essential and major item, of course, was money, and a long term loan was negotiated and accepted. The contractors went to work immediately, but as soon as the material was nicely on the campus and the work progressing the approval of the loan by the Insurance Company was withdrawn.

You can readily see the problem as it now stands. We are under contract with the heating company making the installation without sufficient money to begin to meet the obligation. However, knowing the faithfulness of God's people, we are looking with confidence to the gathering in of the envelopes marked, "My Day's Pay for Bethany." We must have by the end of November forty-eight hundred dollars. It is a considerable sum but with the help and co-operation of all, the need will be met!

By the time this issue of The Highway reaches you this offering will have been received. We trust that everyone who pledged will, with God's help, make good their pledge. If, after reading this and realizing the great and important need, you may feel the constraint of the Spirit to give even more liberally, may God bless you as you obey His leading.
