A letter from this part of the field is long overdue. It's easy to wait until there is something greater to report, and thus not report very often.

We have had a long uphill struggle here, but believe that there has been some real progress. This is our sixth year here, and we have enjoyed the help of the Lord, and have had the consciousness of being in His will. We trust the Lord shall help us to continue in the same state in the future. It was all so

We have had two revival efforts each year since being here. The last meeting was in November with Rev. R. T. Sellick as evangelist and DeVerne Mullen as soloist and song leader. We all felt this to be the best meeting we have had. The attendance averaged about seventy-five, an excellent spirit prevailed, and we saw some good victories. These men make a very able and co-operative team of holiness workers, and we all enjoyed and appreciated their labours.

The work here now, we believe, is quite encouraging. There is a very good interest in all departments of the work; the Sunday evening attendance is from 40 to 60, prayer meeting 18 to 25, and Sunday School of late has been in the 80's, last Sunday's attendance was 89. We are greatly handicapped by only having a small church and no Sunday School rooms (two are in the process of being built now). We also have a poor location for our church. We are praying that God shall help us to remedy these things and really forge ahead with the cause of holiness. We haven't seen the revival that we are praying and looking for, but we believe God will really visit this section of the country with a real "Holy Ghost Revival." This would be the solution to our problems.

We also have been going to Gordonsville for the past four years and the work there is in a healthy condition. They are anticipating the building of a new church before too long. I feel the work there is promising, and that we will see great things in the future.

Each of these churches has a fine group of talented young people, which makes the future more promising.

We have had a very fine Christmas in spite of the fact that Fraser and the car were involved in an accident that has been costly to us, but it is so much better than it could have been that we feel very grateful. There was no permanent injury to anyone and the car is now repaired as good as ever.

We appreciate all the cards, gifts, and remembrances received. The church people here gathered at the parsonage a few days before Christmas, giving us a real surprise. They spent a pleasant evening, served tasty refreshments, and before leaving presented us with a toy Christmas tree decorated with bills amounting to \$70.00. During the meetings there was a love offering taken for us which amounted to \$57.00. At the Christmas Sunday School program in Gordonsville, we were presented a card containing the sum of \$25.00. We appreciate very much the kindness and thoughtfulness of these folk and pray the Lord to richly bless them all.
