Then there is Sussex. Here the people have been holding services in the Orange Hall. It is a fine building and we have been fortunate to have the use of it, but it is not a church, and our people there suffer disadvantages in not having a church building. There had been some hope that a church building in the town, little used, might be bought or rented, but there now seems no hope of such an arrangement. And so, a new church building is needed at Sussex. Here again, generous donations could be used to great advantage in getting a building started. These are projects we should pray about, unitedly and fervently. God is able to supply the need in these communities as He has in others mentioned elsewhere in this Highway.

A special week-end meeting is being planned for Nov. 13-15. It will be held in the Centre-ville Regional High School with Rev. B. C. Cochrane, Deverne Mullen and others as special workers. Please pray for this meeting.

black, with stars of hope, and gilds the storm clouds with silver.

Missionary activity is essential to the Church's spiritual vitality. In the lands where once the Church was empire there is now dearth, false religion and oppression. Mighty churches, with spiritual stalwarts for pastors, once influenced all the lands now held by the Turk. Why? Those churches, like Jeshurun, waxed fat, slothful, disobedient to the missionary command. They refused to carry the light to others. This selfishness produced jealousies, theological wrangles until their light died. Then came the fierce Saracens with fire and sword, and swept them all away.

A comfortable faith is a dangerous deception. A feeling of freedom from world evangelism is a sure sign of loss of love.

In the dacadent periods of church history the importance of externals have been magnified—beautiful buildings, impressive rituals, skilled staffs, patronage of political power—but the missionary spirit faded into nothing, and soon the power to influence men was lost utterly.

Obedienec to the missionary command is the only antidote to littleness, self-righteousness and smug complacency. What does it mean to join the Church? A little less worldly in dress? A little improvement in keeping the Sabbath? A little more careful of the language used? A little more secure when thinking of eternity? Attending prayer meeting? Paying tithe? Is this all that it means to join the Church? NO! A thousand times no! To join the Church is to put your hand in the nail-scarred hand of the Christ and go out to a life of sacrificial service. It is to become a part of a great world fellowship, joined in a great effort to make Christ known to men everywhere—in shops, on street cars, on buses, in factories, in offices, in the remotest corners of this planet. It is to witness for Christ, live like Christ, and work with Christ in evangelizing our generation.

If we would live in obedience to Christ's commands we must be missionary in spirit.

If we would save the Church from dead Laodiceanism we must be missionary in spirit and in deed.

If we would save our souls missions must consume us with a living flame.—Wesleyan Methodist.
