It was thus again and again with the psalmist. But there is something else about the giving of thanks which is more difficult for us to understand yet more necessary for us to appreciate: the giving of thanks should be all inclusive, "giving thanks always for all things unto God." (Eph. 5:20).

Congratulations to Sussex

When one considers that the Sussex Church is less than a year old but nevertheless has an organized young people's society with seventeen regular members, he can hardly avoid making a compliment. According to the letter appearing on this page, the society's program has quite a lot of variety and provides for the participation of all the members. (In these respects the programs of all societies should be similar). For initiative, planning, and enthusiasm, we say, "Hats off to the Sussex Young People's Association."

Organize or Fossilize

Sussex's example should be an incentive to some of our older churches who have seen the passing of a generation without organizing a young people's society.

Perhaps some feel that their churches do not have enough young people to warrant organization. A half dozen teenagers with the help of older church members and a pastor could surely make a success of a society. The older church members could attend services to give support and encouragement. As much as possible, however, the program should use the young people and should appeal to young people. One thing is certain: we shall not improve our situation by doing nothing. More probably we shall find that our church is losing young people because it is not providing for them. I have seen evidence which substantiates my suggestion, and perhaps our topic is not outside the realm of possibility, "Organize or fossilize." C. E. S.

OFFICERS, WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS?

For some time we have been thinking on the matter of leadership and organization in our local societies. Naturally, we were quite happy when we found that another writer had already expressed some of our thoughts, and consequently we are taking advantage of his work. The writer is C. Wesley Lovin, of the Wesleyan Methodists. Much of what he says seems applicable to us. For the sake of brevity we are going to summarize and occasionally quote. (Ed).

1. Leadership is not merely a place of honour but of responsibility. "Time should be given, energies expended, and thought expressed for the purpose of making ours a larger and more spiritual group of young people."

2. A meeting of the executive should be held for the express purpose of planning the new year's work. Face your problems realistically; try to solve them. Give thought to the regular service. "It is a dry, uninteresting meeting."

3. The meeting of the executive could become a regular monthly get-together. Sometimes the meeting could be preceded by a supper at the home of a committee member.

"I am finding that in many cases there is little or no real planning on this level. It seems to be left to one or two individuals, and if they fail the local society fails. Something must be done on the local level regarding this gross inefficiency."

At the monthly meeting financial obligations, special services, projects, ways and means of making the local society more effective may be considered.

"This manner not only keeps the society going but it gives real leadership training which is so badly needed on every level of our church life."
