Before we left the church there we were given a wonderful farewell, with generous gifts and kind expressions of love and fellowship, tendered at a meeting held in The Dawson Club House. We shall never forget the friends at Marysville. Through eleven years of service there, there was never a situation with a sting, nor a lack of cooperation in our endeavor to carry on the work of The Lord.

And now we have taken up the work here at Yarmouth, the faculty of the school, the student body, the members of the church here, and the people of Yarmouth have all been most cordial in receiving us.

OVER \$1,316.00 RAISED FOR MISSIONS AT HALIFAX

Grace Reformed Baptist Church in Halifax concluded its 1st Annual Missionary Conference Sunday, Sept. 20, with a pledge offering for foreign missions of \$1,316.70. The objective was \$750.00. The pledges are to be paid within a year. Pledges ranged from \$5.20 to \$260.00.

The 1st Annual Missionary Conference of Grace Reformed Baptist Church opened on Sunday, September 13th continuing throughout the week. Rev. R. H. Parks, secretary of the foreign mission board and Mr. Glendon Kierstead, student at Bethany Bible College and formerly of Vryheid, Natal, South Africa, were the conference speakers.

Both Mr. Parks and Mr. Kierstead by means of motion and still pictures and missionary addresses gave an overall perspective of our missionary work in South Africa. The people caught the vision and went all out to go far beyond the objective set for the conference.

The original purpose of the Halifax congregation was to support one single missionary on the field. In as much as there is no candidate immediately available for the field, the church is undertaking the building of a new church at Paulpietersburg, Natal. The cost of this church is estimated at around \$600.00.

The ladies of the church under the leadership of Mrs. Hobson made flags representing twelve foreign countries which were placed on the two side walls of the church. The Canadian flag graced the front of the church. A missionary challenge display was placed in front of the pulpit. On this display was a picture of the Halifax church with threads branching to our field in South Africa showing where our missionary work is. On the other side of the board was a map of the world with threads branching out to various parts of the world indicating where we can go. Both Brother Parks and Brother Kierstead displayed a number of curios which created a good interest.

One of the teachers of the Joseph Howe School invited Brother Kierstead and the pastor to visit the school so that Glendon could show his pictures to her class. It turned out that Glendon showed his missionary slides to the whole student body excepting grade one. Both teachers and pupils manifested a keen interest in the pictures and curios.

The young people's society financed the making of slides for Glendon in order that he might have them for the benefit of missionary promotional work. The pastor is thankful to God and grateful to the congregation for their splendid showing in missionary offering.
