GOD BLESSING IN HALIFAX

The blessing of God is continuing in Halifax in the Grace Reformed Baptist Church. The church recently concluded a two week evangelistic campaign with Rev. Ralph Ingersoll, pastor of the Barker's Point Church, as evangelist. A number sought God for salvation, sanctification and spiritual help. The first Thursday of the campaign was observed as fasting and prayer. During the noon hour business men joined the pastor and evangelist for revival blessing. On the Friday night before the campaign closed another special time of prayer was called for 10.00 p. m. A goodly number gathered for prayer and stayed until going on to 1.00 a. m.

The Fredericton Gospel Trio ministered in song on Thanksgiving Sunday. Their ministry was well received. They also sang at Halifax Youth for Christ. The pastor of the Halifax Church is also Director of Youth for Christ in Halifax.

The Halifax Church is entered in the Christian Life Magazine Sunday School Attendance Contest. Before any effort was made for increasing Sunday School attendance the Sunday School averaged 30 per Sunday, including summer attendance. The attendance has been steadily gaining until Sunday, October 25th, a record attendance was reached which was 121. The objective for the Grace Reformed Baptist Sunday School is 250. The motto for the contest is "Christ for Everyone," and the contest slogan is, "We'll Work to Win." The grand prize is a free trip to the Holy Land for the pastor. The first prize in Class "E," which class the Halifax Church is entered is a folding organ, 100 hymn books, and a Radiant Screen.
