### INVOLUNTARY TRANSGRESSION

The best of men need Christ in His high priestly office, to atone for their omissions, their shortcomings, their mistakes in judgment and practice, and their defeats of various kinds. For these are all deviations from the perfect law, and consequently need an atonement. Yet that they are not properly sins, we apprehend may appear from the words of St. Paul, "He that loveth hath fulfilled the law . . for love is the fulfilling of the law" (Rom. 13: 8-10). Now, mistakes and whatever infirmities necessarily flow from the corruptible state of the body are in no way contrary to love; nor, therefore, in the scriptural sense, are they sin. To explain a little further on this head: (1) Not only sin, properly so called (that is, a voluntary transgression of a known law), but sin, improperly so called (that is, an involuntary transgression of a divine law, known or unknown) needs atoning Blood. (2) I believe there is no such perfection in this life as excludes these involuntary transgressions which I apprehend to be naturally consequent on the ignorance and mistakes inseparable from mortality. (3) Therefore, sinless perfection is a phrase I never use, lest I should seem to contradict myself. (4) I believe a person filled with the love of God is still liable to these involuntary transgressions. (5) Such transgressions you may call sins if you please; I do not, for the reasons above mentioned. -John Wesley in "Christian Perfection."

ly for the explanation God has promised. The man who believes in God has found the secret of peace.

"Believe also in Me." Jesus claims faith equally with God. He commands us to believe in both, personally and equally. He asks us to trust Him as we trust God. Faith in one involves faith in the other.

We trust Him as the sinner's Redeemer, Saviour, and Lord. That touches the real source of trouble. Nothing troubles men like sin .Jesus is to be trusted with our sins. He stands between the sinner and his sin, to pardon, deliver, and save. The demons hot upon his track are rebuked, and the tumultuous heart is possessed of a great calm as the Saviour bids him, "Go in peace ,and sin no more." "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me."

"Another Comforter." Providence and pardon do not cover the whole ground of trouble. There is the inner life of the soul, more prolific of perplexity, adversaries, and fears than all our outward life. The uncertainties of the future may give rise to anxiety; but who can fathom the possibilities of his own heart, deceitful above all things and desperately wicked? To guard against the contingencies of fortune is child's play compared with the keeping of the soul. But for all the needs of the inner life ample provision is made in the Holy Ghost, who is given not simply for consolation, but to be our Advocate, Instructor, and Help.

He came to be in the disciples all that the living, personal presence of Jesus had been to them. He is to us in the world as Christ and in the place of Christ. He dwells in us in abiding companionship, reveals to us the Christ as Christ revealed the Father, enlightens and instructs in all the will of God, and empowers for all holiness and service. By Him we dwell in love and keep the commandments of God. Thus He delivers us from all envy and bitterness, from disobedience and denial. He leads and strengthens, enlightens and comforts in all the way of life.
